# ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY

## MEETING MINUTES MONDAY OCTOBER 23, 2023

MEMBERS PRESENT: PAUL NOVOTNY, MOLLY BAUM, MIKE URBAN, MICHAEL TUOHY,

LUKE ISENSEE, AND SUE KEEFE

MEMBERS ABSENT: RANDY PAULSON

OTHERS PRESENT: SARA STURGIS AND CHRIS GIESEN

With a quorum present, the regular meeting was called to order at 4:30 p.m. by Tuohy at the Thurber Municipal Center.

- **A.** The board reviewed the minutes of the September 25, 2023 meeting. Motion by Keefe, second by Isensee to approve the minutes as presented. The motion carried unanimously.
- **B.** The board reviewed the status of the loan fund. All loans were current.
- **C.** Sara Sturgis was present to give an activity update from the Chatfield Alliance including past and upcoming events, with the full report contained in the agenda packet.
- **D.** There were no updates regarding the Chatfield Center for the Arts.
- **E.** Giesen noted that the annual EDA appreciation Gala would be held on November 22, 2023.
- **F.** Giesen reported that the city council will be having a follow up discussion on its strategic plan on November 20, 2023. Consensus of the board were that current strategic plan goals pertaining to development were important and should continue to be city goals.

The board continued its discussion on new home development within the city. Giesen reported that the city's budget committee had reviewed this discussion in the context of what city funding could be made available. In their discussion it was reported that a possible framework for a new home incentive program was identified as well. Serving as a pilot program to test effectiveness, a program that provides \$10,000 to home buyers, applied to the closing cost/purchase price was suggested. A funding source was tentatively identified for such a program by the budget committee. Novotny discussed the Hilltop subdivision and that some lots are selling much less quickly than lots with more desirable attributes. In an effort to maximize the Hilltop tax abatement from the school district and Fillmore County, he suggested focusing a pilot program on specific lots deemed less desirable in this subdivision so that the city could collect as much tax abatement revenue as possible prior to its expiration. He further explained additional issues and concerns he had heard in the community about the inability of some buyers to come up with the full down payment for a newly constructed home, despite being otherwise qualified for a loan. In particular, he supported creating a program that would assist home buyers as opposed to developers. Tuohy was concerned about limiting the scope of eligible lots and wondered if a new "energize Chatfield" fee could be established to pay for such assistance programs, as opposed to providing city funds. The board discussed the benefits, concerns, and questions

at length. Giesen reminded the board of the city attorney's comments about finding a public purpose for such a program and finding a source of funding. Consensus of the board was to hold a special meeting in early November to continue this discussion in order to determine if such a financial assistance program was advisable and to have staff invite the Hilltop Estates Developer to that meeting to discuss their project and current conditions.

- **G.** There was no other business.
- **H.** Motion by Urban, second by Isensee to adjourn the meeting. The motion carried unanimously. The meeting adjourned at 5:30 PM.

With a quorum present, the special meeting was called to order at 4:30 p.m. by Tuohy at the Thurber Municipal Center.

A. The board met in special session to continue the discussion of creating a new home incentive program. Home developer Geoff Griffin was present to discuss his current projects and issues he is hearing from clients; including the inability to fully fund a down payment for new homes. The board continued the discussion of a possible program framework started at the prior meeting.

Isensee entered the meeting at 4:37 PM.

The board discussed at length. One version a program would focus benefits to the Hilltop Subdivision and potentially less desirable lots in order to maximize the remaining tax abatement revenue from the school and county. Another version discussed would include all buildable lots in the city, regardless of location. It was also discussed that whatever program is implement, a strong marketing campaign would help boost the effort and also highlight the investment made by the city. Consensus was to create a program that would provide \$10,000 cash to home buyers of any new home constructed in Chatfield, limiting the rebate to the first six new homes in 2024. The incentive would be paid at closing to the buyer. Homes would need to be at least 1,008 and on a permanent foundation. Applications would be taken on a first come first serve basis. Staff should also create a marketing effort to promote the program. Funding was suggested from excess lot sale proceeds on the lots sold along Enterprise Drive. Motion by Isensee, second by Keefe to recommend that the city council create a new home rebate program as discussed. Motion carried unanimously.

Giesen will fashion a program outline for council consideration at the December council meeting.

#### 1. Chatfield Alliance report

As a heads up – the Alliance director has recently taken a position with the Center for the Arts as its director. There will be a transition period given the change in staffing levels until a new Alliance director is found.

#### 2. New home development assistance program update

The city council did not approve the EDA's recommendation to establish a \$10,000 rebate program. If the EDA is still interested in discussing we can do so but we should consider alternative approaches.

Alternatives that have previously been agreeable to the EDA include revising development standards (city planner/engineer have been working on this), revising our development/connection fees, and eliminating fees for "infill" lots to encourage use of existing infrastructure.

#### 3. Chatfield Center for the Arts annual report

#### 4. Lonestone Subdivision Outlot C

In line with discussions to promote housing development in the community, an unused parcel owned by the city has been identified that could have a home built on it. "Outlot C" in the Lonestone subdivision (see included plat map) appears to be a buildable lot – it's unclear exactly why this lot was retained by the city other than for park or buffering purposes, but seeing how the neighborhood developed, this outlot appears to be a fit for a home. Especially considering the city has no other plans for the property and must maintain it (mowing, etc...).

The city planner is reviewing easements and setbacks to determine more specifics but at first glance it appears that there is enough buildable ground to construct a home that is similar to other homes in the neighborhood. The planner is also working with the city engineer to determine utility connection cost estimates.

Could/should the city sell this lot for the purpose of building a new home? What should the city do with the proceeds? Should there be any requirements or special provisions to the deal?

ACTION REQUESTED: Discuss and if desired, make a recommendation that fits the EDA's goals.

#### The Year In Review

At the beginning of 2022, Chatfield Center for the Arts, Inc., found itself temporarily homeless as the Phase II renovation of the 1916 school, building link, and Potter Auditorium continued. Nonetheless, CCA continued its multi-year campaign of arts programming to strengthen the local arts culture, attract regional participation, and demonstrate the economic value of a vibrant arts community. Without a home building for most of the year, CCA worked to draw visitors to other institutions in downtown Chatfield; once the building reopened, CCA presented an ambitious season and laid a foundation for future programming.

Early-year off-site programming included a staged reading of the classic Twelve Angry Jurors at the Chatfield Public Library, three Chosen Bean folk concerts in the Fellowship Hall of Saint Mary's Church, a performance by the Luther College Jazz Orchestra at Chatfield Lutheran, and tours to St. Paul and Winona to view the art at the State Capitol and the Marine Art Museum. The youth day camp and Music in the Park concert series returned after their 2021 premieres. Potter Auditorium and its direct support spaces were available for the Western Days musical performances by Wits' End Theatre. Chatfield Center for the Arts re-opened on September 24th with a three-stage event featuring regional and national musicians, an art exhibit, food trucks and beer tasting.

At the end of CY2022, both earned revenues and expenses were lower than budgeted. Unlike past years, this shrinkage had very little to do with COVID cancellations and more to do with the sheer uncertainty that now attaches to consumer spending on leisure and recreation. As sales proved slow to return to pre-COVID levels, CCA worked to cut expenses appropriately. Our sponsorships and grants kept pace with previous years, and private donations and rentals continued to grow.

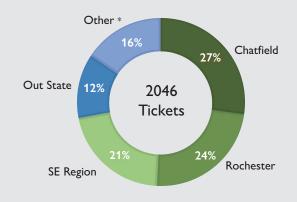

## **Regional Outreach**



Vibrant and diverse arts events and programs engage Chatfield residents and attract audiences and artists from around the region. Data from CCAs' ticketing platform show that 72% of tickets sold in 2022 were to patrons residing within a 50-mile radius surrounding Chatfield. Diverse arts programming included CCAs' production of the regional collaboration play *All in the Timing*, a performance by the Luther College Jazz Orchestra, a family matinee featuring the Okee Dokee Brothers' Band, and a Grand ReOpening celebration.

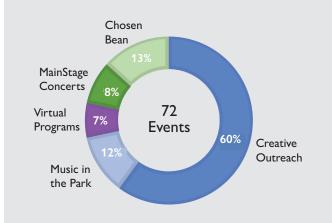

### **Community Outreach**



Building community engagement through creative community outreach events is a primary focus of CCA programming.
Creative outreach included a one-week art and adventure youth day camp, music in the Chatfield City Park band shell, performances by local artists during the weekly farm market, creative classes and workshops, and virtual programs. CCA offered 43 community outreach events throughout the year, engaging 741 patrons.



#### **Artistic Merit**



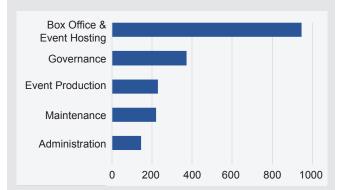
The Minnesota State Arts Board (MSAB) awards Operating Support and Creative Support grants to arts organizations that demonstrate programming excellence, participation in the arts, and financial stability. In 2022, MSAB awarded CCA \$62,554 for Operating Support with funding appropriated through the Arts and Cultural Heritage Fund and an American Rescue Plan grant funded by the National Endowment for the Arts. A new Producer Fund was established with \$50K of generous donations to support events featuring renowned national artists.



#### **Volunteers**



Gifts of time and energy are essential to the success of all events and activities at CCA. Forty-four active volunteers contributed 1915 hours in 2022 to maintain and improve the building, research and engage artists, staff the box office, distribute flyers, sell concessions, usher performances, and serve on the Board of Directors and CCA Action Committees.

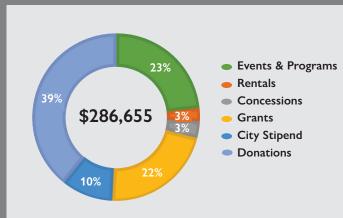

Annual 2022 revenues exceeded expenses due to local, state, and federal grant awards and generous donor contributions. A significant increase in equipment assets is due to the in-kind donation of a baby grand piano.

#### Revenues



Overall revenues were 6% higher than expected due to a 50% increase in donations, including the newly established Producer Fund. This increase was offset by a 60% reduction in event and program revenues due to consumer spending apathy and the renovation closure.

#### **Expenses**



Total expenses for the year were 6% lower than budgeted. Costs related to event programming were 20% lower than anticipated due to reduced programming for the facility renovation. The cost to produce events was offset by a 30% increase in utility costs (after the city reimbursements) for utilities in January through June.

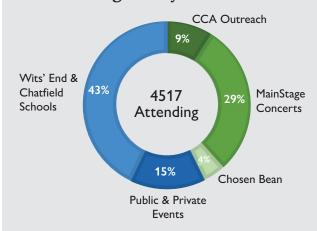




## **Building Use by Number of Events**



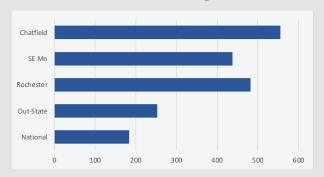
## **Building Use by Attendance**



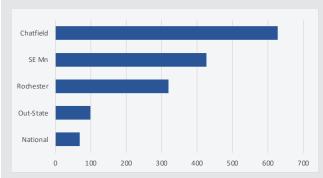

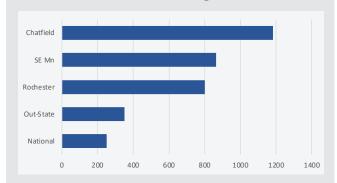

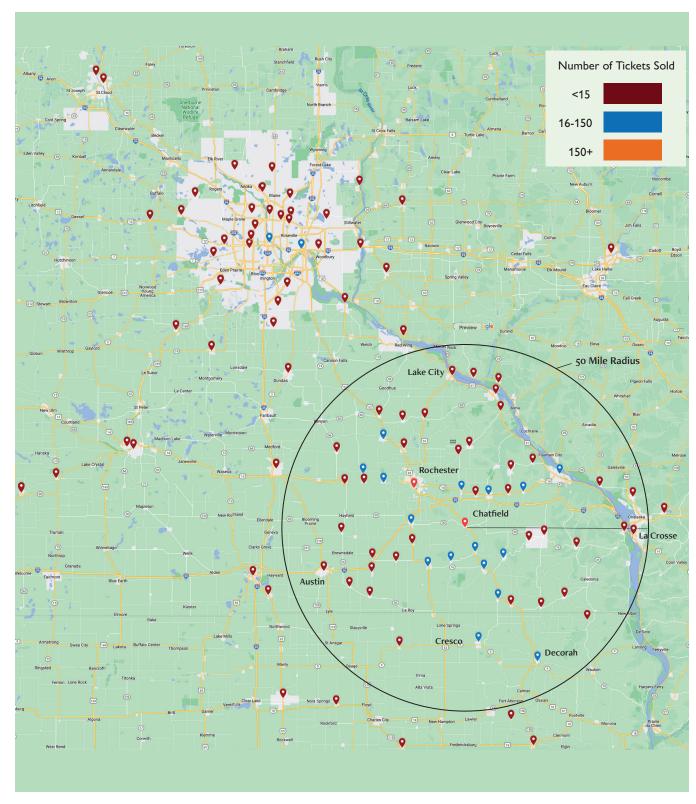


### **Tickets Wits' End Programs**
