Potter Auditorium &

the Elementary School Buildings...

The transformation of the elementary school that is being vacated, along with Potter Auditorium, represents one of the greatest opportunities and challenges to our community in a really long time. This article is intended to shed light on some of the issues that go along with transforming a public building from one use to another and to provide an opportunity for residents to discuss these same issues.

The opportunities are fairly obvious as there is always a need for museum space, senior citizen space, meeting rooms for civic groups and more. Furthermore, the enhancement of Potter Auditorium could be the community's single biggest opportunity as it has the potential to host many activities attractive to residents and visitors.

The challenges are pretty obvious, too. There is no question that there is an emotional attachment to these buildings that have educated the youth of our community for so many decades. There is no question that residents and visitors have a natural affinity for the dis-

tinctive architectural features of the 1916 building and Potter Auditorium. There is no question that people appreciate the functionality of the 1954 building that has accommodated the many breakfast fundraisers, community education activities and soapbox derbies over the years. And, there is no question that everyone knows that it costs real money to heat and maintain these buildings.

At a time like this, when a school district no longer needs a building, the District needs to make decisions fairly rapidly because of the costs and liabilities involved. Simply put, school districts have little ability to hold and maintain buildings that they no longer need.

That notwithstanding, the Chatfield School District has been quite accommodating in exploring the opportunities the facilities offer.

In late 2007, the District assembled a fairly broad group of residents who met for a number of months, providing input on the future uses of Potter Auditorium and the surrounding property. It became clear that District patrons placed a high value on Potter Auditorium and would like that facility enhanced. Eventually, as it became clear that the demolition of the 1916 and 1954 buildings would be under consideration, the

District asked the City to retain a Preservation Consultant to conduct a study of the entire property in order to better understand the historical significance of the property. Late in the fall of 2008, the District assembled a smaller group who were charged with applying for grant funding from the legislature and federal government. That effort continues, including discussions about who should own this property and how to provide continuing funds to support the property in the future.

The City has been assisting this effort in several ways. It has addressed this property in its Park Master Plan, its Land Use Plan and has officially stated that it is interested in this property in the context of maintaining a "town square." At the same time, the City's Heritage Preservation Commission has been managing the study that is exploring the historical aspects of the property.

The transformation of Potter Auditorium and the elementary buildings is one of the highest priorities of the community. The School District and the City are working together where possible and hope that the variety of challenges and opportunities, some of which conflict with each other, are understood by the public.


