## THE CITY PROPERTY TAX-WHERE DOES THE MONEY GO?

broad array of services, one of the best ways to understand how the City spends its tax dollars is to take a somewhat categorical view of those services.

In 2006, of all non-utility fund expenditures, 28% of the City of Chatfield's budget will be spent on Public Safety, like police, fire & ambulance. Another 28% of the budget will be spent on Public Works, like streets, sidewalks & parks while 20% will be spent on General Governmental functions, 10% on Debt Service, 9% on Culture & Recreation and 6% on Planning & Development. Like most cities in Minnesota, public safety, public works and general services make up the The City's Truth In Taxation hearing will be major share of the city budget.

> The 2006 tax levy will actually be about \$57,000 higher than the 2005 levy. Fortunately, though, the amount of new construction in our community will allow the city tax rate to stay about the same as it is now, even with that levy increase. New development can certainly cause a demand for new services but it also provides new tax revenue. An increase in value will be the main reason for any increase in city tax on properties in 2006.

## THE UTILITY BILL

## ... A FUEL SURCHARGE ON GARBAGE COLLECTION

The utility bill that is enclosed with this newsletter includes a new charge, called a "fuel surcharge". This was L recently requested by the garbage hauler because diesel fuel costs are so much higher than anyone anticipated when the basic hauling contract was put in place a few years ago. The most standard way of dealing with this kind of cost is to impose a fuel surcharge that fluctuates with the price of fuel.

The way this will work is that a fuel surcharge will be imposed whenever the average price of diesel fuel exceeds \$1.50 per gallon in the Midwest. City staff will retrieve information from the United States Department of Energy each month. The higher the price rises above \$1.50, the higher the surcharge will be. As prices start to settle down toward the base rate of \$1.50 per gallon, the surcharge will also decrease. For this month, the average price of diesel fuel is \$2.85 per gallon,

which causes the surcharge to be \$.61 per household. Next month, it will be re-calculated.

#### WINTER PARKING

he City of Chatfield has ordinances that govern onstreet parking in the winter to ensure that our snow plowing crews are able to clear snow off city streets as safely and efficiently as possible.

City Ordinance 3.1.4 does not allow vehicles to be parked or to be left unattended on the streets or in the alleys such that they interfere with the plowing or removal of the snow.

If it is snowing or is about to snow, do not park on the street until the street is plowed from curb to curb.

Parking is strictly prohibited in the downtown area during snow removal. Snow removal is in process when the snow has been banked in the center of the streets to allow for pick up and removal. Vehicles parked which interfere with the snow removal process will be towed.



Parking tickets may be issued and cars may be towed if parked cars interfere with snowplow-

ing or snow removal process.

The fine amount for a ticket issued for violation of Ordinance 3.1.4 is \$25.00 plus about \$55.00 of towing fees plus impound fees.

Snow Removal—The snow removal process, which is when all snow in the downtown area is plowed and banked into the middle of the downtown streets for collection and removal.

Children and Snow- PRO-TECT YOUR CHILDREN! Remember it is dangerous for children to build snow forts or sliding hills along any City street. The snowplow operators cannot see little children playing in or on top of snow banks and cannot stop quickly during the plowing operation. Remind kids to play safely when snowplows are out.

#### SIDEWALKS

reproperty owner or occupant of a lot in the city having sidewalks, in front of or on the side of the lot, is responsible for keeping the sidewalks free from snow and ice. Snow and ice needs to be cleared from the sidewalks within 24 hours of falling. Please respect the safety and convenience of your fellow residents and keep the sidewalks clear. Snow should not be shoveled, plowed or blown onto a public street.

To assist in keeping the *public* walks clear, citizens may obtain small amounts of salt / sand from the City sand pile located by the garage on the State property at the South end of Winona Street. Please limit yourself to a 5 gallon pail. This service is not meant for private driveways or parking lots, rather it is meant to keep public walkways safe for all to enjoy.


#### SNOWMOBILES

 $\intercal$  t is that time of the year to get those snowmobiles ready for the upcoming season. Remember while in town you must:

- Drive on the right side of the roadway.
- Bring the snowmobile to a complete stop at every intersection, before crossing a street, whether or not it has a stop sign.
- Obey the posted speed limits. Ride in a direct route to and from the trail.
- Must have permission to operate on someone else's private property.
- Unless on a designated trail, stay out of City parks, as snowmobiles are prohib-
- Remember to be respectful and courteous to others.

Also, if you are going to use alcohol remember that the new .08 applies to snowmobiles. Please don't drink and drive.
